

Innovative use of small space design



The teams benefitted from working together

With only 12 hours to go before the grand opening, all the designers were finalising their own designs and checking with everyone else to ensure they were on track and happy with their progress. There was no competitive streak or attitude shown to each other, everyone offered genuine thought, care and concern. This, in my mind, is something all involved should be enoud of.

There were benefits from working together. We had more bargaining power and greater appeal to companies for sponsorship, more drive with organisers, and also a base from which we could all communicate and share information and knowledge. This to me seems to be the most advantageous way of co-coordinating such a big effort. It worked on all

We each designed four completely different styles of gardens. Outhouse designed a modern countyard called the 'Urban Nest', Spade Design designed a seaside countyard called the 'Coastal Retreat', Sticks and Stones Landscape Design designed a contemporary outdoor entertaining countyard called 'The Countyard' and I designed a flowering enclosed space focused on the importance of bees in the urban environment called 'Politication'.
